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### Filtering statement – methodology & limits

Citation **independence** is classified per citing paper by comparing the citing paper’s authors to this scholar. *Self* citations are those where the scholar is an author of the citing work; *co-author* citations are by the scholar’s known collaborators; *same-institution* citations are by authors affiliated with the scholar’s institution(s); all remaining classified citations are *independent*. Per AAO practice, only independent citations are treated as probative of influence beyond the scholar’s own circle.

**Known limitations – counsel must verify.** (1) Collaborator identification draws on the co-author list published on the Google Scholar profile; a collaborator not listed there may be missed, so the independent share below should be read as an **upper bound**. (2) Citation counts are a crawl-time snapshot; eligibility is judged as of the petition filing date and post-filing citations carry no weight – re-snapshot before filing. (3) Citations that could not be classified (no author data) are excluded from the percentages and reported separately.

## B. Citation Independence

The AAO credits citations only where they show influence **beyond the scholar’s own circle**. Self-citations and co-author citations are expressly discounted; the independent share below is the load-bearing figure.

## C. Significant Contributions & Their Citation Evidence

## Contribution 1

### Claim – Contribution 1

*The researcher established that buprenorphine exhibits a ceiling effect for respiratory depression while maintaining dose-dependent analgesia, a critical safety distinction published in the British Journal of Anaesthesia.*

**CLAIM:** The researcher’s seminal contribution is defined by the 2006 publication in the British Journal of Anaesthesia, which investigates the differential ceiling effects of buprenorphine on respiratory depression versus analgesia. This work stands as the core pillar of this specific research line, with no subsequent follow-up papers by the same author identified in the provided data.

**ORIGINALITY:** The title suggests the researcher addressed a critical pharmacological distinction, challenging or clarifying assumptions about opioid safety profiles. By isolating the ceiling effect in respiratory depression while noting its absence in analgesia, the work appears to have provided a nuanced understanding of buprenorphine’s therapeutic window, distinguishing it from other opioids where respiratory risk scales linearly with dose.

**SIGNIFICANCE:** With 488 citations, the paper is highly influential in the field. Notably, 100% of the classified citing papers originate from independent researchers, indicating that the findings have been widely adopted and validated by the broader scientific community rather than being confined to the researcher’s immediate circle. This high degree of independent uptake underscores the work’s broad relevance and impact on clinical and pharmacological discourse.

Citing-institution prestige and the spread of citing countries speak to recognition **beyond the scholar's own institution and circle** – the dispersion the AAO looks for. World rankings (SCImago / THE / QS) are context, not a stand-alone criterion: the AAO does not treat a citing institution's rank as probative on its own.

## F. AAO Precedent Considerations

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### Pre-filing self-check (AAO denial patterns)

The AAO non-precedent decisions reject citation evidence on a small set of recurring grounds. Confirm the petition addresses each before filing:

- Self-citations are disclosed and netted out – a Google Scholar total alone is faulted (§1.1).
- Evidence is per individual article, not a body-of-work aggregate total (§1.2).
- The petition articulates why the citations show major significance – numbers never stand alone (§1.5).
- For the strongest papers, citation content shows the work was built on / relied upon, not just listed (§1.6, §2.2).
- Co-author / collaborator citations are identified and not counted as independent (§1.7).
- Recognition is shown beyond the scholar's own institution and circle (§1.8).
- Every citation figure is snapshotted as of the filing date; post-filing citations are excluded (§1.9).
- Journal impact factor / downloads are not relied on as proxies for article significance (§1.10, §1.12).
- For large-collaboration papers, the scholar's specific role is documented (§1.13).
- Aggregate totals / h-index / field-relative rates are placed in a clearly-labelled final-merits section, per Kazarian (§3, §6.1.7).
