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### Filtering statement – methodology & limits

Citation **independence** is classified per citing paper by comparing the citing paper’s authors to this scholar. *Self* citations are those where the scholar is an author of the citing work; *co-author* citations are by the scholar’s known collaborators; *same-institution* citations are by authors affiliated with the scholar’s institution(s); all remaining classified citations are *independent*. Per AAO practice, only independent citations are treated as probative of influence beyond the scholar’s own circle.

**Known limitations – counsel must verify.** (1) Collaborator identification draws on the co-author list published on the Google Scholar profile; a collaborator not listed there may be missed, so the independent share below should be read as an **upper bound**. (2) Citation counts are a crawl-time snapshot; eligibility is judged as of the petition filing date and post-filing citations carry no weight – re-snapshot before filing. (3) Citations that could not be classified (no author data) are excluded from the percentages and reported separately.

## B. Citation Independence

The AAO credits citations only where they show influence **beyond the scholar’s own circle**. Self-citations and co-author citations are expressly discounted; the independent share below is the load-bearing figure.

## C. Significant Contributions & Their Citation Evidence

## Contribution 1

### Claim – Contribution 1

*The researcher advanced fuzzy time series forecasting by developing methods to optimize interval lengths, a foundational contribution evidenced by over 800 citations in a seminal 2001 publication.*

The researcher established a significant contribution to fuzzy time series forecasting through the 2001 publication 'Effective lengths of intervals to improve forecasting in fuzzy time series' in *Fuzzy Sets and Systems*. This work serves as the core foundation for this line of research, with no subsequent follow-up papers by the same author listed in the provided data.

This line of work appears to address the methodological challenge of determining optimal interval lengths within fuzzy time series models. By focusing on the effectiveness of these intervals, the research suggests a novel approach to enhancing forecasting accuracy, distinguishing itself from prior methods that may have lacked such specific optimization strategies.

The significance of this contribution is underscored by its substantial citation count of 831, indicating widespread adoption and influence within the field. Furthermore, the available classification data shows that 100% of the analyzed citing papers originate from independent researchers, suggesting that the work has resonated beyond the researcher's immediate academic circle and has been independently validated by the broader scientific community.

Citing-institution prestige and the spread of citing countries speak to recognition **beyond the scholar's own institution and circle** – the dispersion the AAO looks for. World rankings (SCImago / THE / QS) are context, not a stand-alone criterion: the AAO does not treat a citing institution's rank as probative on its own.

## F. AAO Precedent Considerations

### Pre-filing self-check (AAO denial patterns)

The AAO non-precedent decisions reject citation evidence on a small set of recurring grounds. Confirm the petition addresses each before filing:

- Self-citations are disclosed and netted out – a Google Scholar total alone is faulted (§1.1).
- Evidence is per individual article, not a body-of-work aggregate total (§1.2).
- The petition articulates why the citations show major significance – numbers never stand alone (§1.5).
- For the strongest papers, citation content shows the work was built on / relied upon, not just listed (§1.6, §2.2).
- Co-author / collaborator citations are identified and not counted as independent (§1.7).
- Recognition is shown beyond the scholar's own institution and circle (§1.8).
- Every citation figure is snapshotted as of the filing date; post-filing citations are excluded (§1.9).
- Journal impact factor / downloads are not relied on as proxies for article significance (§1.10, §1.12).
- For large-collaboration papers, the scholar's specific role is documented (§1.13).
- Aggregate totals / h-index / field-relative rates are placed in a clearly-labelled final-merits section, per Kazarian (§3, §6.1.7).
